George Rogers



George is a Development Manager at Chesterfield Canal Trust. He is trained as a civil and structural design engineer and has previously designed civil infrastructure for National Grid and water companies. He is now employed by the Chesterfield Canal Trust to manage all aspects of restoration project development, funding and delivery alongside all necessary legal agreements, stakeholder engagement and strategic positioning.

George has a long history with canals and particularly canal restoration. He grew up living next to the Cromford Canal and now lives close to the Derby and Sandiacre. He has volunteered extensively with Waterway Recovery Group (WRG) leading, cooking and volunteering on over 60 week-long canal camps and festivals and is currently a WRG director. He is part of the high-level panel for the Restoration Hub and has previously been a Trustee of the Friends of the Cromford Canal, establishing and chairing their Strategic Restoration Committee alongside spells as the work party organiser and webmaster.

Just occasionally, George gets to go boating, mainly by cherry picking the best opportunities to meet up with his parents who recently retired onto a narrowboat as continuous cruisers. Most recently he has enjoyed time on the Caldon, the Anderton Boat Lift, Standedge Tunnel and the Leeds & Liverpool Canal around Skipton.

Gemma is a Countryside Service Manager at Derbyshire County Council. She originally trained as an ecologist and geographer, and has been involved in countryside management for her entire career, both in Local Authorities and for a brief stint in academia.

Gemma is now employed by Derbyshire County Council as a Countryside Service Manager for the Countryside Service, recently passing 17 years in the Service. She is responsible for the development and management of over 120 countryside sites across the country of Derbyshire, including woodlands, country parks, multi-user trails and, of course, canals.

In what has been a significant shift in expertise, Gemma has been involved in the management, maintenance and restoration of the Derbyshire section of the Chesterfield Canal for the entirety of that 17 years, supporting the day-to-day work of a team of site managers, project officers, rangers and wardens. Significant achievements include the ongoing development of Tapton Lock Visitor Centre in Chesterfield, increased and diversified boating on the canal and making the case for significant ongoing investment in the maintenance of the canal's infrastructure during times of austerity in Local Government. She is a member of the Chesterfield Canal Partnership.

Gemma has ambitions to learn how to pilot a stand-up paddleboard, and loves catching sight of a kingfisher as it whizzes past along the canal – a sign of successful canal management in her book.
