

### What to do if you hear the alarm

nearest assembly point which can be found on the **Emergency Action notice** located within escape routes and near call points.



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Stay at the assembly point and do not enter the building until you are told to do so by in authority. (Normally Security or the Fire Rescue Service).

#### **Access Control**

There are access control systems in operation around Waterside Campus. You will need to obtain a lanyard from the Senate reception if you need to gain access through speed barrier gates located within the academic buildings

#### Reception

The main campus reception is located at the ground floor of the Senate building and is manned Monday to Friday between 8am and 5pm. Telephone 01604 892323.

An out of office time service will be available in the learning Hub (SID) desk, open Monday to Friday between 5pm and 8am and 24 hours on Saturdays and Sundays.

### Bv car

4.5 miles (approx) from the M1 Junction 15, Drive along London Road A45 and then follow the signs to the University.

Guests can use the car parks on either sides of the campus - car park 1, 2 & 4 as for the Site Map above. Please note Park Avenue is restricted - guests coming from New South Bridge Road (A508) wishing to park in car park 4 will need to use post code NN4 8RR; guests coming from University Bridge (A428) and wishing to use car parks 1 & 2, will need to use post code NN1 5PH.

### Parking

Parking does not need to be pre-booked at weekends.

Parking charges are applicable to all visitors, except Blue Badge holders and motorbikes. Parking payment must be made on arrival by cashless payment machine (contactless or chip and pin) or RingGo.

Payment and parking is linked via the Automatic Number Plate Recognition system so there is no need to display a ticket in your vehicle. To top up parking, users will either need to revisit the payment machine or use the RingGo app. If the payment machine is not working, visitors at Waterside can utilise another machine in an alternative car park or use the RingGo phone/app/website facility.

On Saturday, Sunday, Bank Holidays and Closed Days, the tariff (24 hours from midnight) is £1 all day.
